100th **Anniversary**. A rather damp day to commemorate the 100th anniversary but went off surprisingly well. All the stalls turned up and there was a good turnout for the service which included the Mayor, Cllr Margaret Smidowicz being the first to ring the 'Anniversary Bell'.

The bell is mounted on a tripod and can be rung. The inscription on the bell reads '100th ANNIVERSARY LOUGHBOROUGH CARILLON 1923 – 2023' each letter and number paid for by a member of the public. The image is of Peter and the Mayor of Charnwood. It was Peter's persistence that saw this project over the line.




Coincidence. Neil was on duty in the Yeomanry Room on the day of the 100th Anniversary of the unveiling of the Carillon War Memorial. He was showing a group of visitors the stereoscope using a photograph picked at random.

Amongst the group was this visitor, the photograph in the stereoscope at the time showed the destruction of the village of <u>Poelcapelle</u>, near Ypres. The gentleman took the card out and read the inscription. "I am from Belgium and that is my home village." he said, such an amazing coincidence.

The story does have a happy ending. Apparently, the village was completely rebuilt after WW1, exactly as it had been in 1914 and he and his family now live happily there.

Emmanuel Church. You will know from previous newsletters that Neil put together a 'Roll of Honour' folder using Marigold's research on the Loughborough casualties in the Great War, information he researched, including a visit to County Records and an excellent introduction as to the thinking behind the conventions when war memorials were being produced.

Three copies of his work were produced, one for us, one for the Local Studies Group and the third was for the Emmanuel Church and on Sunday 23 July we (Neil, myself and Mary) attended the morning service and at the end of the service Neil addressed the congregation, an excellent explanation of his work, and the fact that each of the 75 names listed on the Emmanuel Church memorial was a



person sorely missed by family and friends and why churches felt it necessary to have their own separate memorials.

After the handover I was talking to a gentleman who admitted that, until then, he hadn't even noticed the memorial. The church's copy will be left out on a small table for the public to view. Our copy will be on display in the tower.

What's New. We have been offered a painted portrait and the sword of one of Loughborough's most famous soldiers, WO1 (RSM) Harry Lovett (his entry on the Leicesters' database is here) He was a legend in his time. He was against the building of the carillon and rallied the exservicemen of the town to support a proposal to build a row of cottages for disabled soldiers. They then switched their support to back the proposal to build a medical centre as a memorial to the fallen.

However, when the people of Loughborough were asked to vote the carillon won by a narrow margin. Almost certainly due to the fact that the committee who wanted a carillon phrased the question to favour the building of a carillon.

Interesting that he served in Dublin during the uprising. The British

Army has, all too often, had a bad press for their involvement in Ireland but I have seen a letter from the residents of Ballsbridge (the area in Dublin where the 2/5th Leicesters' were operating during the uprising) thanking the battalion for their good behaviour and politeness. I am sure RSM Lovett had something to do with their excellent discipline.

Note. (WO1 is the rank, Warrant Officer class 1 and RSM - Regimental Sergeant Major is his appointment. WO1 is the highest non-commissioned rank)

Medals. My father's uncle, <u>L/Cpl Walter Gould</u>'s 1914/15 Star was offered for sale on eBay last week, he was awarded the Military Medal so the star was just one of four he was entitled to. Such a pity that medal sets have been split up like this and it reminded me that we have numerous single medals. The image is of the WW1 Victory Medal of Pte Kirkwright, West Riding Regiment. Why have we got it in our collection?

I will, next week, send out a list and providing we all agree, those with no local interest or connection, can be advertised amongst other military museums to see if we can match them up.

PS. I was outbid for Walter Gould's medal. It sold for over £70.
